

#### Significance of a Child's Room

Doctor Johnson said, "If a child invites friends to their own room, they'll learn about manners faster than a child with a shared room. Also, it'll give them a sense of pride when a friend visits." Johnson also said, "Many parents used to feel sharing a room brings children closer. However, we know now that in reality it's the opposite. The lack of personal space causes conflict and arguments."

In other words, children that have their own room are better at handling responsibility and mature sooner than children that don't. ## Barrier Gate Channel: A Wonderful Place for Dating Posted by Isla at 10.28 pm on 5 August 2021



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



Using a story from a nature magazine, you are going to take part in an English oral presentation contest. Read the following story about South Africa in preparation for your talk.

Kruger National Park in South Africa is one of Africa's best protected wild animal parks. It is situated in the northeast corner and borders Zimbabwe and Mozambique. Its land size is a little bigger than the island of Shikoku in Japan, and it is home to 500 bird species and 145 mammal species, including lions, elephants, and cheetahs. Before the park was established in 1898, the area was a paradise for hunters, farmers and people looking for materials like gold because diseases like malaria and wild nature kept most people away. Hunters went unchecked and caused significant damage to animal numbers. Luckily, Paul Kruger, the president of South Africa at the time, realized that the animals needed protecting. He took the big and risky step of creating the Sabie Game Reserve, where hunting was restricted. It would then be combined with another reserve and farms to the north and later named "Kruger National Park."

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However, making people follow the rules was extremely challenging and needed a park protection warden. It wasn't until the end of the Anglo-Boer war in 1902 that the first warden was appointed. This difficult job was given to James Stevenson-Hamilton. He was known to forcefully stop people from damaging the park, so earning him the local-language name "Skukuza," meaning "he who sweeps clean." Although these actions made him few friends, they created the foundations for the park that we now have today. Stevenson-Hamilton did not just have a vision for animals to live peacefully, he also saw a place where people could pay to come to view the amazing nature.

The park opened to the first paying visitors for a small fee in 1927. However, only three cars entered the park in the first year. In the late 1920s, the park lacked the infrastructure to support large numbers of visitors. In the ten years that followed, 3,600 kilometers of roads and several fenced camps were constructed inside of the park, allowing a boom in tourism. There were few rules for visitors. They could do anything, even in the dangerous environment. There are various stories of visitors having to climb trees to escape hungry lions. Therefore, the park made rules like not leaving one's car and returning to camps before dark to ensure visitors' safety. In 1935, over 26,000 visitors were registered to have visited the park, and in 1936 the largest camp and headquarters was named Skukuza to honor Stevenson-Hamilton for helping to make the park a success.

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
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
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Over the next few years, Kruger National Park battled with land ownership claims and companies wanting to dig the land for coal. Meanwhile, the success of tourism continued. By 1969, the challenging task of building 18,000 kilometers of wire fence around the park to protect the animals inside and to keep out unwanted hunters was completed. Several main roads were also covered with asphalt to make driving and viewing animals easier.

Another turning point came in the form of commercialization in the 1990s. Some camp services, like restaurants, were contracted to private companies. There were also several new, more luxurious camps and hotels constructed to provide a higher class of accommodation, targeting overseas visitors. In 2002, visitor numbers reached an astonishing one million people, bringing in important funds to help to continue to maintain the park. During the same year, the long-term dream of expanding the park's borders into South Africa's two eastern neighbors, Zimbabwe and Mozambique, began to be realized. Once completed, this area, called the Great Limpopo Transfrontier Park, will have no fences, so animals can move freely, and the area will become the world's largest animal reserve.



## Fight Ocean Pollution While Having Fun

- [1] Water is vital for our survival. It is one of the major substances that constitute the human body. It also plays substantial roles in agriculture, industry, and sanitation and hygiene. Therefore, humans need clean water. However, human activities have polluted water resources in many parts of the world. Something must be done to cope with this problem, and actually many things are being done. Some of these things call for special knowledge and skills, while others are so simple that they are open to ordinary citizens. They may seem too small to make a difference, but in fact such small things contribute to the conservation of clean water resources and support our well-being.
- An example of such contributions was made in Copenhagen, [2]Denmark. Copenhagen Harbor used to be a naval base and industrial shipping port. However, in the 1990s, it underwent a major transformation and was reborn as a place for commercial and recreational uses. Today, the harbor is widely used by both locals and travelers for boating, bathing, and picnicking. As the place gained popularity, many new buildings and facilities were constructed, turning the neighborhood into a vibrant destination. Copenhagen Harbor is now one of the city's important landmarks and has also inspired many other cities to create urban spaces and activities around a port. This expansion, however, caused pollution as well. People who came to the harbor encountered a large amount of plastic and construction waste in the water. This was a serious problem not only because the waste spoiled the view but also since it did actual harm to the environment. The water in the harbor was polluted, of course, but that was not all. The waste was carried out to the ocean by the tide

and damaged the wildlife there. Something had to be done.

[3] Then, a non-profit environmental organization launched a unique system named "GreenKayak" to reduce the waste in Copenhagen Harbor. They focused on the responsibility of the locals and tourists in addressing the pollution problem. The system goes like this. Anyone who comes to the harbor can borrow a kayak free of charge for up to two hours. But there is one condition the borrower must agree to: to collect rubbish during their trip through the waterway. They can contribute to improving the environment of the harbor while enjoying the great view from the water. In fact, kayaks are suited for cleaning the water because their small size and mobility allow the paddlers to get close to water areas which are hard for larger boats and ships to reach. Besides, those free kayaks have a distinct green color so that people can easily tell them from regular rental kayaks. This helps other visitors to recognize the environmental problem that the harbor faces and the efforts to fight against it.

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- [4] "GreenKayak" has been a huge success. Those volunteer paddlers have collected more than 11 tons of waste, and the water environment of Copenhagen Harbor has been improving. This unique attempt based on good will has found support from outside Denmark, and now the organization also works in several other countries. In 2019, they received an environmental award from the Danish government, which meant their activities were now recognized nationally. It also meant the small activities of individual volunteers made a big difference.

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**B** You are studying issues in health care policy. You found the following article about the health care system in the United States.

The United States spends more on health care than any other country in the world. Although it has advanced treatment centers for cancer and other diseases, its overall health results lag behind those of other developed countries.

Every year, the U.S. spends more than USD 10,000 on health care for each resident. This is twice what Canada and Japan spend. In addition, U.S. residents pay a little less than half of those health care costs by themselves. The situation is very different in other developed countries. For example, Canadians pay a larger share of their country's health care costs than Japanese people, but they pay less than one third of the total health care costs in their country.

Despite high levels of spending, U.S. lifespans are close to lifespans in countries like Chile, the Czech Republic, and Turkey, which spend much less on health care. The U.S. spends almost ten times as much as Turkey, but Turkish lifespans are only 1.4 years shorter. Since 1980, Turkish lifespans have increased by nearly 20 years while U.S. lifespans have increased but fallen further behind those of other developed countries.

Certainly, there are many possible reasons why U.S. lifespans compare poorly with those in other developed countries. For example, over one third of U.S. residents have weight problems. This contrasts with the situation in Turkey and Canada, which have obesity rates of just over and just under 30%, respectively, and Japan, where less than one out of every 20 people have this problem. In turn, weight problems lead to heart disease, strokes, and other health conditions. The U.S. also has higher injury rates from car accidents than many other developed countries.

A major reason for high U.S. health costs is administrative costs. In the U.S., insurance companies work with doctors' offices, hospitals, and government agencies to manage health care. This increases administrative costs, since these organizations must work together to

decide how much health services cost and whom to bill for them. In the U.S., medical procedures have very different prices depending on where they are performed; whether insurance companies, the U.S. government, or patients are paying; and other conditions. As a result, common knee or hip replacement surgeries can cost anywhere between USD 11,000 and USD 74,000. Partly because of these basic uncertainties about prices and payment responsibilities, administrative costs account for 8% of health spending in the U.S. By comparison, administrative costs total 1% to 3% of health spending in other countries.

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Other factors are important, too. For example, spending on medicines is 1.5 to 3 times higher in the U.S. than in other countries. Similarly, salaries for doctors and other medical professionals are up to 2.5 times higher. These high costs influence people's behavior. For example, U.S. residents are less likely to consult with doctors than people in other countries. Some refuse to take needed medications and avoid ambulances and hospitals even when they face serious health issues.

By international standards, the high costs paid by U.S. residents do not result in healthier lives or greater access to medical care. Many Americans are starting to notice lower costs and better results in other countries, so they are trying to change their country's approach to health care.


