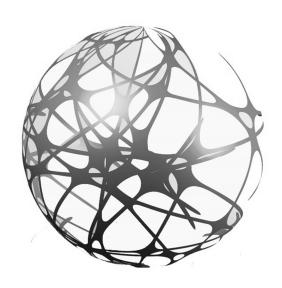

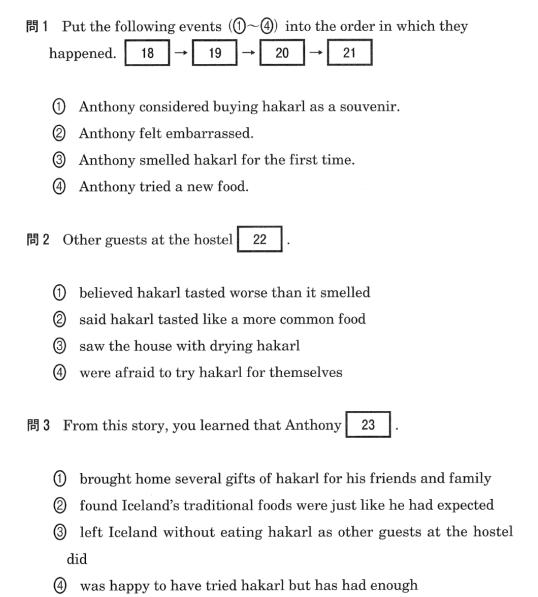

Thank you for your email. There are some problems with your plan. First, 210 "Women's History and Revolution" and 240 "The Origins of European Colonialism" are second-year courses and are not open to first-year students like you'll be. Next, a "mandatory" course means a course you must take. The university requires all students to pass several foundation courses — courses basic to a rounded education. For you, this is 100 "Western Civilization" which is on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 10:45-12:15. You have to take this course so you must drop 170 "IT Applications for Business". You can take it in the second term. Next, you have listed 160 "Art, Science, and Economics", Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, 9:00-10:30, but I can't find that in the syllabus. There is 160 "Change in the English Novel", however. Perhaps you made a mistake. Last, it looks like you're taking too many courses; you need special permission to take six and as a rule it is not granted in the case of first-year students.

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You mentioned that you want to take the Economics Specialization from your second year on. In order for you to enter that Specialization, you need several required courses. One of them is 180 "Data Visualization" Tuesdays and Thursdays 16:00-17:30. Why don't you take this instead of the 160 you listed? Because you will still have four courses, another thing you could do is add an additional course; I suggest 140 "The Impact of IT on UN SDGs", Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays 14:15-15:45, which has connections to the 170 "IT Applications for Business" that you wanted to take. So, you'll have five courses in your first term, complete a requirement for the Economics Specialization and have the recommended course load.

I hope this helps you. Let me know if you have any other questions.

"It feels good to have our ideas appreciated," said Donna. "Tomo and I felt like we contributed to the hotel's success."

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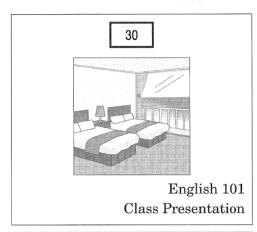
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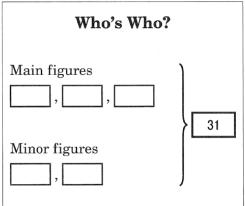

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A You are working on a class project about originality in art and found the following article. You are reading it and making a poster to present your findings to your classmates.

Does Originality Exist?

Many people complain that entertainment isn't original anymore. Almost everything is based on something that existed before. The most obvious modern example is movies, most of which are sequels or reboots. But even when movies are "original," they're based on novels, TV shows, or even older movies. Novels are similar to movies in that many books written now are based on a historical event, or have characters that are taken from earlier stories. Music also draws melodic influence from songs from 20 or 30 years ago. But when did this borrowing from earlier works of art and entertainment begin? Is it a recent occurrence? Possibly, the real question is "did originality ever actually exist?"

You may be surprised to learn that even the word "originality" wasn't used until the mid-1700s. Because the word didn't exist, one can assume that originality in art (or in anything!) wasn't considered important before then. You may ask, "But what about famous artists like da Vinci and Michelangelo? What about Shakespeare? What about Mozart and Vivaldi?"

In fact, the famous artists of the Renaissance worked very hard *not* to be original. They trained by copying and trying to perfect styles that other artists had been developing before them. You may have noticed that all Renaissance paintings or sculptures look similar; there are actually very few differences from one artist to the next. In addition, the themes of these works of art weren't from the artists' imagination; most of the famous paintings of the time are portraits, or are scenes and events described in the Bible.

Shakespeare also worked with themes or stories that existed before

his lifetime. He adapted previously-existing stories with new characters, or wrote stories based on history. The plot of *Romeo and Juliet*, one of Shakespeare's most famous plays, is actually used in stories that were written many years before Shakespeare was born. And of course, Shakespeare's plays *Julius Caesar* and *Macbeth* were based on historical figures and important events in their lives.

Classical composers worked with themes from older works of art and literature as well. Operas were adapted from ancient mythology and the Bible. And as with the Renaissance painters, classical composers imitated the styles of musicians who had achieved fame before them. Younger musicians were trained by masters, so they used the skills they gained from those lessons when they later began composing their own music.

You may have noticed by now that themes from the Bible are often represented in art, literature, and music. But even the Bible isn't an original work of literature. Many stories from the Bible are actually adapted from myths that existed long before the Bible was written. And those stories would also have come from earlier sources. So, if originality has never actually existed, how do artists, writers, and musicians come to be admired for their originality?

Although it is true that no one is original, there's another way to identify greatness: creativity. The creative approach an artist takes is important to making his or her work memorable. Shakespeare wrote plays with plots that had appeared in much older stories, but no one before Shakespeare had ever written so beautifully. The same can be said of most of the famous painters and composers in history.

Considering these points, rather than trying to achieve the impossible standard of being original, artists should instead develop their creativity. Once you know that some variation of every story has already been told, every song has already been written, and every picture has already been painted, then you begin to realize it is the artist's creativity that determines whether he or she will be remembered for centuries.

B You are studying about health issues. You are going to read the following article to understand more about what is happening in the U.S.

Not all American food is unhealthy. Recently there has been interest by many Americans in eating healthier, natural, organic and low-calorie food. However, generally speaking, the least healthy foods are the tastiest, cheapest and easiest to get in large portions.

Since the 1970s, the American diet has dramatically changed in both what people are eating and how much they are eating. Between 1970 and the early 2000s, the daily calorie intake per person had leaped by an average of over 500 calories. This is an increase of about 24 percent. Americans are becoming larger, too. The average American man now weighs 199.8 pounds (90.6kg). In the late 1970s, the average was 172.2 pounds (78.1kg). Alongside a rise in body weight, dangerous diseases such as heart disease, diabetes, and metabolic syndrome have become more common.

There are several reasons for this. People are eating out in restaurants more often. While it is possible to have a healthy meal in a restaurant, researchers have found that diners eat between 20 and 40 percent more calories there. A single meal or trip to a buffet-style restaurant can be enough to account for one person's daily recommended calorie intake. Supermarkets also do not help by offering shoppers discounts if they buy more. Furthermore, with food-pricing wars and improved technology to make processed ready-made and convenience food, combined with modern farming techniques and food imports, food costs have dropped.

What people are eating more and less of compared with 1970 is varied. However, there has been an interesting shift within each food group. In the meat group, chicken consumption has risen sharply

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whereas beef has fallen sharply. Among dairy products, Americans eat much more cheese and consume a little less milk while, surprisingly, the amount of ice cream consumed has stayed largely the same. Food made from corn has seen an extremely big jump with a rise even more than that of cheese. As for the main carbohydrates of potatoes and rice, Americans are now consuming somewhat more rice and far fewer amounts of potatoes. Despite it appearing that Americans are eating more of the healthier types of foods, how much people are eating is really where the problem lies.

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There are a few simple things that may help to maintain a healthy diet and prevent disease brought on by obesity. When eating out, order half as much of heavy foods like fried and processed food. Instead, ask for double the amount of vegetables. Another technique is to downsize the serving amount. You can trick your brain into thinking there is enough food by using smaller dishes. And finally, avoid distractions like smartphones or TVs during a meal. By focusing fully on the food, it is easier to feel more satisfied and full and enjoy the food.

Unfortunately, there is no easy solution to the problems that Americans face. Transforming the food industry is a huge battle. Food companies and fast-food restaurants want people to eat more so that they can sell more. The biggest changes will come when individuals understand the risks of unhealthy eating habits through good education in schools and by the media. Only then will people be able to have proper self-control to make the right choices of what to eat and how much.

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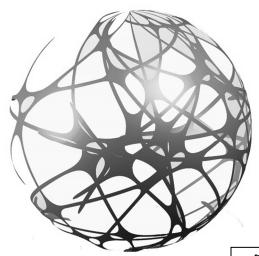
